PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Blue Valley Community Action (BVCA) Partnership Head Start 0-5 program delivers comprehensive and high quality services designed to foster healthy development for low income families and at risk children. Head Start services are responsive and appropriate to each child's and family's development, ethnic, cultural and linguistic heritage.

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership conducts a center-based Early Head Start Child Care Partnership program serving 44 children 0-3 in a childcare facility while providing monthly home-visits. The primary focuses of the Early Head Start Childcare Partnership program are child development, parenting, and self sufficiency skills.

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership operates a home-based Early Head Start Program serving 90 children ages 0-3 and pregnant mothers. Families receive weekly home visits for 11/2 hours and two socialization opportunities a month. The primary focuses for the Early Head Start program are child development, parenting, goals to strengthen the family, and self-sufficiency.

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership provides center-based Head Start services to 239 children ages 3-5. During the 2016-2017 school year, Blue Valley Community Action Partnership Head Start Program collaborated with Beatrice Public School, Crete Public School, Fairbury Public School, Southern Public School, Thayer Central Public School, and York Public School in effort to provide quality preschool services to more at-risk children in these communities. The program provides 3-7 hours of class time, over four to five days a week. The program is at no cost to families and provides 1/3 of a child's daily nutritional requirements.

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership 0-5 Head Start Program believes that parents are a child's first and most important teacher. Blue Valley Community Action Partnerships encourages parents to be involved in all aspect of the program. Parents have the opportunity to be involved in parent meetings, family events, parent trainings, Policy Council, and classroom. Families receive a monthly home visit for Early Head Start Childcare Partnership and Head Start and weekly home visits if they participate in the homebased Early Head Start program. Family Advocates assists families with assessing their needs, accessing resources, setting goals for their child and family, and linking families with their community.

At Blue Valley Community Action Partnership's Head Start Program Parent Engagement is high priority as it is essential to social emotional well being and academic success.



PARENT ENGAGEMENT

Four hundred forty eight families received Head Start 0-5 Services during the 2016-2017.

Preparing Children for Kindergarten



Blue Valley Community Action Partnership Head Start 0-5 programs help to prepare children for kindergarten by involving parents in their child's education at an early age by nurturing their overall development.

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership Early Head Start Childcare Partnership center based program and Head Start center based program uses Creative Curriculum in the classrooms. The Early Head Start program uses Parents as Teachers on home visits for children 0-3 and pregnant mothers. A parenting curriculum was introduced in the middle of the 2016-2017 program year, What You Do Matters, as a part of the Parents as Teachers curriculum. Blue Valley Community Action utilizes the Teaching Strategies GOLD as the assessment tool for Head Start 0-5 programs. Teaching Strategies GOLD focuses five areas: Social Emotional, Develop-

ment, Physical Development, Cognitive Development, Approaches to learning, and Language Development.

The following illustrates Blue Valley Community Action's School Readiness Goals and Outcomes:

Readiness Goals for Social Emotional Development:

BVCA 0-3:

Children will demonstrate responsive interactions and relationships with others

Children will begin to develop control over some feelings and behaviors

Children will begin to internalize some rules, routines, and directions

BVCA 0-5:

Children will demonstrate healthy regulation of emotional expressions and behaviors

Children will establish and sustain positive relationships

Children will participate cooperatively and constructively in group settings at school, in the community and with family



Readiness Goals for Physical Development:

BVCA 0-3:

Children will develop control of large muscles for movement, navigation and balance

Children will demonstrate coordination of small muscles by using hands and fingers to control objects and increase fine motor skills

Children will begin to identify and practice healthy and safe habits

BVCA 3-5:

Children will progress in traveling skills to move purposely in their environment and demonstrate more coordinated movements (such as balance, throwing, catching) in play and games.

Children will demonstrate control of small muscles for such purposes as using utensils, self care, building and exploring.

Children will identify and practice healthy and safe habits

Readiness Goals for Cognitive Development:

BVCA 0-3:

Children will begin to use math concepts in daily routines

- Shapes and their properties
- Counting using one-to-one correspondence
- Awareness of numbers and quantities up to 3

Children will use their senses to explore and discover their surroundings, including

- Knowledge of physical properties of materials
- Children will begin to connect new experiences with what they remember

BVCA 0-5:

Children will use number concepts and operations in daily routines including

- identifying shapes, their properties, and how they are related to one another

Children will use scientific inquiry to gain understanding of their surroundings, including

Children will begin to learn and show how print works (books, environment print, other text)

Children will engage with stories, books and environmental print, beginning to learn how picture, symbols and print are used

Children will use scribble, shape, pictures or emergent or pretend writing for purposeful representation of thoughts.

BVCA 3-5:

Children will comprehend and use expressive language for conversations and communication needs

Children will demonstrate phonological awareness including discriminating rhymes and dicaramity alliteration

Children will identify and name letters

Children demonstrate knowledge of print and its uses (books, environmental print, other text)

Children will use emergent writing skills in their daily routines and environment

English language learning children will demonstrate an increasing ability to comprehend and speak English, while maintaining their home/primary language

FEDERAL REVIEW

During the week of March 20, 2017 the Administration for Children and families conducted an on-site monitoring review of Blue Valley Community Action Partnership's Head Start preschool classrooms. The protocol utilized during the review is an evidence-based assessment, CLASS (Classroom Assessment Scoring System). This assessment scores the relationship between adults and children in the classroom by observing seven key dimensions; Positive Climate, Negative Climate, Teacher Sensitivity, Regard for Student Perspectives, Behavior Management, Productivity, Instructional Learning Formats, Concept Development, Quality of Feedback, and Language Modeling. The assessment score is assessed on a seven point scale, with seven being the high score with the exception of negative climate.

Overall, Blue Valley Community Action did very well. The information was shared with the Governing Board, Policy Council, Management, Staff and stakeholders. The information is used to plan for training and coaching opportunities for teaching staff and coaches.
