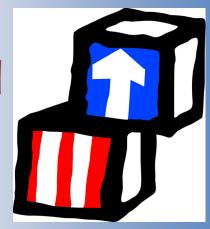

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Blue Valley Community Action (BVCA) Partnership Head Start 0-5 program delivers comprehensive and high quality services designed to foster healthy development for low income families and at risk children. Head Start services are responsive and appropriate to each child's and family's development, ethnic, cultural and linguistic heritage.

BVCA conducts a center-based Early Head Start Child Care Partnership program serving 44 children 0-3 in 2 childcare facilities while providing monthly home visits. The primary focuses of the Early Head Start Childcare Partnership program are child development, parenting, and self sufficiency skills.

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership operates a home-based Early Head Start Program serving 90 children ages 0-3 and pregnant mothers. Families receive weekly home visits for 11/2 hours and two socialization opportunities a month. The primary focuses for the Early Head Start program are child development, parenting, goals to strengthen the family, and self-sufficiency.

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership provides center-based Head Start services to 239 children ages 3-5. During the 2019-2020 school year, Blue Valley Community Action Partnership Head Start Program collaborated with Beatrice Public School, Crete Public School, Fairbury Public School, and Thayer Central Public School, in effort to provide quality preschool services to more at-risk children in these communities. The program provides 3-8 hours of class time, over four to five days a week. The program is at no cost to families and provides 1/3 of a child's daily nutritional requirements.

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership 0-5 Head Start Program believes that parents are a child's first and most important teacher. Blue Valley Community Action Partnerships encourages parents to be involved in all aspect of the program. Parents have the opportunity to be involved in parent meetings, family events, parent trainings, Policy Council, and classroom. Families receive a monthly home visit for Early Head Start Childcare Partnership and Head Start and weekly home visits if they participate in the homebased Early Head Start program. Family Advocates assist-families with assessing their needs, accessing resources, setting goals for their child and family, and linking families with their community.

At Blue Valley Community Action Partnership's Head Start Program Parent Engagement is high priority as it is essential to social emotional well being and academic success.

Preparing Children for Kindergarten

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership Head Start 0-5 programs help to prepare children for kindergarten by involving parents in their child's education at an early age by nurturing their overall development.

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership Early Head Start Childcare Partnership center based program and Head Start center based program uses Creative Curriculum in the classrooms. The Early Head Start program uses Parents as Teachers on home visits for children 0-3 and pregnant mothers. The parenting curriculum was used for the first full year, What You Do Matters, as a part of the Parents as Teachers curriculum. Blue Valley Community Action utilizes the Teaching Strategies GOLD as the assessment tool for Head Start 0-5 programs. Teaching Strategies GOLD focuses five areas: Social Emotional, Development, Physical Development, Cognitive Development, Approaches to learning, and Language Development.



The following illustrates Blue Valley Community Action's School Readiness Goals and Outcomes:

Readiness Goals for Social Emotional Development:

BVCA 0-3:

Children will demonstrate responsive interactions and relationships with others

Children will begin to develop control over some feelings and behaviors

ANNUAL SELF ASSESSMENT

The Annual Self Assessment was held March 4, 2021. Twenty four attendees, with two parents and oone Policy Council Member. The team worked in three small groups and looked over the three goals of Children Services. Each group analyzes data and discusses on how to move forward. Suggestions are brought to the large group and new goals, objectives, or action steps are implemented into strategic plan.

2018-2019 Goals from Self Assessment

GOAL 1: INCREASE SELF-SUFFICIENCY AND WELLNESS KNOWLEDGE AND SKILLS FOR STAFF AND FAMILIES TO POSITIVELY IMPACT SCHOOL READINESS OF CHILDREN.

Objective and Measures: The program will have a gain of at least 0.3 on all 14 new PFCE indicators measured on a 1-5 scale for families enrolled fall to spring each school year

GOAL 2: ENHANCE MENTAL AND BEHAVIORAL SUPPORTS TO INCREASE POSITIVE INSTRUCTION AND RELATIONSHIPS.

Objective and Measure: By Spring each year, 85% of kindergarten-bound children will be at or above age level in development as measured by TSI GOLD snapshot and Growth reports.

GOAL 3: STRENGTHEN COMMUNITY RELATIONS TO PROVIDE CONTINUITY OF SERVICES FOR CHIL-DREN AND FAMILIES AND ENSURE FISCAL STABILITY

Objective and Measure: Interactions among the program and communities will be recorded, reflected upon, and used for program improvement as measured by various progress noted on Action Steps.

FEDERAL REVIEW

During the 2019/2020year, Blue Valley received a Federal Review from the Office of Head Start. The Office of Head Start revamped their monitoring system to align with the five year grant period.

Focus Area one (first year of the grant) The Grantee will have an opportunity to discuss their program design, management and governance structure. In addition, this focus area is designed to develop an understanding of each grantee's foundation for program services. Grantees will describe approaches to staffing structure, program design, education health services, family services, fiscal infrastructure and program governance.

Focus Area Two (second year of the grant) review is an opportunity for grantees to demonstrate their effectiveness in implementing a high –quality program to promote positive outcomes and school readiness for children and their families. This focus area is designed to broaden the Office of Head Start's (OHS) understanding of each grantee's performance and to determine if programs are meeting the requirements of the Head Start Program Performance Standards (HSPPS), uniform Guidance, and the Head Start Act.

CLASS Review will be conducted in year two or three of the grant cycle. A percentage of the preschool classrooms will be observed using the CLASS tool. The Classroom Assessment Scoring System.

During Year four and five the grantee will be given an opportunity to speak with OHS and fill in any gaps or make improvements if suggested.
