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BLUE VALLEY COMMUNITY ACTION PARTNERSHIP ANNOUNCES SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Blue Valley Community Action (BVCA) Partnership is now accepting applications for our 2023-2024 scholarship opportunities. All scholarships will be in the amount of \$1,000 and can be used for tuition, books and fees associated with enrollment. Three scholarships will be awarded. BVCA Partnership will offer the following scholarships this year:



- The "BVCA Partnership Scholarship" will be awarded to an individual planning to attend or currently attending a 4-year college.
- The "BVCA Partnership Vocational Scholarship" will be awarded to an individual planning to attend or currently attending a 2-year or less program at a vocational college.
- The "BVCA Partnership Southeast Community College Scholarship" will be awarded to an individual planning to attend or currently attending Southeast Community College.

Applicants must reside in BVCA Partnership's service area, which includes Butler, Fillmore, Gage, Jefferson, Polk, Saline, Seward, Thayer and York Counties in Nebraska. Scholarship applications, guidelines and a listing of eligibility requirements may be obtained from area high school administrative or guidance counselor offices, or by contacting the BVCA Partnership Center in your area. On August 29, 2023, BVCA's CEO, Shari Weber had the opportunity to be a part of a Launch & Learn panel at a Beatrice community event that was hosted by Gage Area Growth Enterprise (NGage). NGage is a county-wide economic development group that works to create opportunities for businesses to start, grow or move to Gage County. NGage created an initiative called Communities for Kids (C4K) in response to community requests for assistance with shortages of highquality early care and education programs.



The Launch & Learn brought community members and local businesses together to network and learn more about the childcare issues and efforts happening in Gage County. BVCA WIC PROGRAM NAMED RECIPIENT OF NATIONAL GRANT

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership is pleased to announce it is one of 36 national recipients of WIC Community Innovation and Outreach Project funds. WIC CIAO is supported by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Food and Nutrition Service and aims to support efforts to develop, implement, and evaluate innovative outreach strategies to increase awareness, participation, and benefit redemption in the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), and reduce disparities in program delivery.

BVCA Health Department Director, Danielle Meade said, "Our activities focus on outreach into our communities. We are going into doctor's offices, daycares, different points of food access like churches and food banks. Anywhere somebody is going to look for food or help in anyway. We're working with these partners to educate them on what we do, how we can help, and how they can bring people needing assistance to us."

Reaching out to new partners has already demonstrated a marked increase in BVCA WIC's program numbers. Meade said prior to these efforts, the average number of WIC participants was 850 per month. Now that number is closer to 1,100.

BVCA WIC is the only program in the state of Nebraska to receive these funds, and the results of the program could potentially help other WIC programs, particularly those serving rural client bases like BVCA, in their own outreach efforts.

WIC provides healthy foods, nutrition education, breastfeeding counseling and referrals for to pregnant and postpartum individuals, infants up to 12 months, and children up to age 5. In 2020, only 50 percent of all eligible individuals nationwide participated in WIC, equating to a shortfall of almost 6 million individuals. The WIC CIAO Project aims to change that by expanding partnerships with community organizations and using community-level data to develop and implement innovative WIC outreach efforts.

Reaching more families with WIC will have positive impacts on the community. WIC has been shown to provide wide-ranging benefits, including longer, safer pregnancies, with fewer premature births and infant deaths; improved dietary outcomes for infants and children; improved maternal health; and improved performance at school, among others. In addition to health benefits, WIC participants showed significant savings in health care costs when compared to non-participants.

WIC CIAO is administered through a USDA cooperative agreement with the Food Research & Action Center (FRAC), in partnership with the Gretchen Swanson Center for Nutrition, the Native American Agriculture Fund, and UnidosUS. WIC CIAO is part of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service broader initiative to modernize WIC.
