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#### **BVCA CELEBRATES COMMUNITY ACTION MONTH**

2024 marks the 60th year since the Community Action Network was established to help American families and communities overcome obstacles to poverty. Over 1,000 agencies across the country are working every day to create opportunities and transform the lives of their neighbors making communities stronger and helping families across the U.S. thrive. This year, Blue Valley Community Action Partnership (BVCA), a proud member of the Community Action Network, will also commemorate 58 years of helping families throughout southeast Nebraska including the counties of Butler, Fillmore, Gage, Jefferson, Polk, Saline, Seward, Thayer and York (limited services are also offered in surrounding counties).

"Each May, during Community Action Month, we reflect on the impact BVCA and our network has had on families," said Shari Weber, BVCA CEO. "Last year alone, we served 7,273 locally, and over 15 million across the country with immediately needed services such as shelter and food, and also long-term solutions like education." BVCA provides services such as financial education, affordable rental housing, homeownership opportunities, weatherization and home rehabilitation, veteran services, nutrition assistance, WIC, immunizations, Head Start 0-5, emergency assistance, volunteer opportunities and so much more.

Community Action Agencies serve 99% of all American counties with life-changing services to help families achieve financial stability. All agencies are locally controlled and represented by the private, public, and low-income sectors of the community. "We are proud of our communities' participation in the development and oversight of our programs," said Weber. "Their engagement helps us to be more effective in our approach by determining local needs." To celebrate the continued success of Community Action and raise awareness throughout southeastern Nebraska, BVCA will be hosting various events throughout the service area and highlighting on our Facebook page.

She will oversee the Head Start, Early Head Start, Blue River Early Learning Academy, and the Infant Toddler Quality Initiative programs for BVCA. She will play a critical role in ensuring that all young children are prepared for academic and lifelong success. Kyanna was kind enough to answer some questions about herself so our communities can get to know her a little better!

When did you join BVCA as Children Services Director? *I joined BVCA in October 2023.* 

Can you tell us a bit about your personal, educational and professional background? I received a Bachelor of Science and Business in Agriculture, a minor in Leadership Studies nonprofit option, and earned a certificate in Nonprofit Organizational Leadership from Kansas State University.

I grew up highly involved in 4-H, FFA and other leadership-based organizations. I enjoyed service projects and creating impact on my community. When I was young, my older brother was diagnosed with cancer. My family received a tremendous amount of support from our community and other foundations. This support was a huge determining factor in our success story. It inspired me to join the Leadership Studies Department at Kansas State University to study nonprofit structures so that one day I could offer the support that I had received. The department also allowed me to continue doing service projects and work with the Riley County Community. The projects I took the most interest in were battling food insecurity, poverty, and mental health awareness for youth.

What inspired you to get into the field of Early Childhood Education? Being a witness to childhood cancer at a young age has always given me an extra appreciation for those who work with children in all shapes and forms. As an adult, I remember the support our family received and believe it was this that put me on the path to become who I am today. BVCA's Children Services Department has the ability to build confidence and inspire these children by creating a solid foundation for them in their formative years. That inspired me to want to join their team and continue the impact they make every day.

What have you found most rewarding with BVCA? While I have experience working in nonprofits, I do not have a direct background in early childhood development and education. However, this has been a motivating factor as I grow in this position. I have a great team who are true experts of their craft and have made this transition exciting. I love the mission of BVCA and the people I get to work with every day.

## 2023 IMPACT REPORT October 1, 2022-September 30, 2023

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership assisted 7,273 individuals by offering life-changing services that provide solutions to help build lives of stability, dignity and prosperity.

3,290 children | 3,025 adults | 958 elderly

Of the 6,062 individuals enrolled in goal-setting programs, 5,907 achieved one or more outcomes.

#### housing

346 individuals obtained safe, affordable housing.

59 individuals obtained safe, temporary housing, which was 86% of those enrolled.

453 individuals avoided eviction or foreclosure. 287 evictions prevented | 166 foreclosures prevented

1,588 individuals maintained independent living.

87 individuals received services resulting in their home being weatherized, preserved, and/or otherwise improved.

129 individuals were provided Housing Counseling, which includes homebuyer, rental and mortgage education as well as case management.

#### financial stability

86 people increased their financial knowledge and skills.

94 people increased their savings and assets.

46 unemployed individuals obtained a job to improve employment skills or increase income, which is 72% of those enrolled.

#### education & cognitive development

340 children became school ready.

234 children improved social and emotional skills.

223 improved positive approaches toward learning.

1,046 families improved their family functioning skills.

2,841 adults and children received educational case management

#### health & well being

3,555 people received nutritious food.

2,229 individuals demonstrated improved health and well being.

1,864 physical health | 365 mental and behavioral health

171 received dental screenings and exams.

376 received immunizations.

2,818 received physicals.

261 received vision screenings.

1,162 received developmental screenings. 1,840 received substance abuse screenings.

604 received mental health assessments.

218 individuals were employed.




Benefit value per hour is \$5.61 includes health, vision, dental, retirement, life and the Employee Assistance Program (EAP).




- 50% of poverty is \$15,600 gross

- 200% of poverty is \$62,400 gross

Current Nebraska minimum wage is \$12.00 per hour or \$24,960 full-time gross, significantly below the poverty rate for a family of four.





#### FORMER BVCA CEO INDUCTED INTO HALL OF FAME AWARD IN NATION'S CAPITAL



On March 14, 2024, National Community Action Foundation (NCAF) honored many at their Annual Policy and Advocacy Conference on Capitol Hill in Washington, DC. Two awards included Nebraska natives—former CEO of Blue Valley Community Action Partnership (BVCA), Richard "Rick" Nation, and Community Action of Nebraska's Executive Director, Tina Rockenbach.

Professionals from all over the United States convened in the nation's capital to engage in conversation with Congressional leaders regarding the work of Community Action and the people they serve. Attendees also spent a day at Capitol Hill with Nebraska Congressional Representatives to discuss more specifically how to produce effective solutions to current economic challenges.

During the Conference, Rick Nation, Former CEO of BVCA, was inducted in the inaugural class of Community Action Hall of Fame. Rick served as CEO of BVCA for over 40 years and was actively involved in advocacy work that helped lead the way for Nebraska. He engaged with law makers to prioritize advocacy within the state network and became involved with policy makers by being the face and voice of those served in Nebraska. He continues to stay actively involved in advocacy as it relates to Community Action and its fight against poverty.

When asked about Rick's contributions, current BVCA CEO, Shari Weber, stated, "Rick was an extraordinary leader whose passion was to create programs and effect legislation to improve the lives of those in need. He had a knack for thinking outside of the box and he wasn't afraid to challenge the status quo."



Receiving the award for an Outstanding State Association in Supporting NCAF's Federal advocacy efforts will be Community Action of Nebraska's Executive Director, Tina Rockenbach. Rockenbach has become a pivotal part of the States advocacy efforts by following in the footsteps of Rick Nation. Rockenbach shared, "When I became the Executive Director of Community Action of Nebraska almost three years ago, one of my goals included increasing advocacy efforts and to get our state back to the level of involvement motivated by Rick Nation. I want to regain our voice on both the State and National Level for Nebraska. To remind people in our state who we are and what we do. That Community Action is available to help anyone." Rockenbach will be 1 of 10 from Community Action State Associations across the nation to be recognized.
